TRUMAN MUSEUM TOUR

On a rainy, dreary day on March 11th, 46 members of the KC Triumphs and MG clubs visited the newly renovated Truman Library in Independence. And some brave souls drove their sports cars!

The library didn't disappoint.

The self-guided tour allowed for visitors to go at their own pace stopping to watch short videos of interest in unique settings that drew them in. The various reading materials and hands-on exhibits allowed for exploration of the various topics.

The exhibits take visitors through Truman's humble beginnings in Missouri as a farmer in Grandview. As well as highlighting many of the well-known facts about him such as: his ascent to the presidency after Roosevelt's death, his involvement in WWII and the atomic bomb, his reelection and whistle-stop campaign, and emphasis on his famous down-home manners. Exhibits also covered other not so well-known events such as his volunteering to become an artillery Captain in WWI. This is where he devel-

oped his leadership style and confidence as he was able to wrangle a bunch of Kansas City Irishmen into a functioning unit that respected him. He claimed he didn't lose a person or a horse in battle. Also, on display was: his lasting impact on our current White House as it was falling apart when he arrived, his influence on civil rights, particularly for black veterans from WWII, and his influence on the Korean War both for good and bad.

The library did a good job, in this writer's opinion, to set out the facts as they were seen at the time and let the visitors make their own judgments. Of interest were the McCarthy era trials that presented both the concerns about the spread of communism and the impact it had on freedom of speech and Hollywood. There were several topics of this nature sprinkled around the larger known events.

Everyone concluded that one visit was not enough to soak it all in. The day ended with lunch for many at The Courthouse Exchange in downtown Independence. It too was very good.






ROAD TRIP PREPARATION TECH SESSION

Fort Givens, a strategically positioned, hilltop compound, on the Leavenworth western frontier was the site of our most recent Tech Session. Commanding officer, Retired Lieutenant Colonel Jeff Givens, hosted the March 18th session on preparing your Triumph for long trips. Fourteen club members attended. Jeff drives his Triumph TR-3A all over the country and participates in European rallies logging thousands of miles a year. He is always well-prepared for roadside emergencies but cautions that his preparedness does not insure he will bail out a less well-provisioned convoy member! To avoid that dilemma, he shared tips on components to check/renew if necessary, fluids needing replacement/topping up, tools, and spare parts to stow away just in case an emergency roadside "tech session" is required. Jeff's flip chart topics are below. Jeff also provided a list of 38 essential parts to carry along and demonstrated how they all fit in one small, stowable box.






Where did all the horses disappear to? Back when General Motors was selling intermediate-size cars with the 215 cubic inch aluminum V8 in the early 1960s they were claiming as much as 175 horsepower from it. To reach that lofty number they had upped the compression ratio to well above 10:1, were running a cam with lots of overlap, and were sporting a 4-barrel carb. American hot rodders ported the heads and opted for cams with even lumpier idles and spun higher RPM to find still more horses but that sacrificed drive-ability and reliability. It seemed like a great engine but after just a couple of years GM cast it aside in favor of larger cast iron blocks with aluminum heads. The story is that a Rover exec was touring a GM facility here in the USA and spotted some of the aluminum blocks stacked in a corner and asked what they were and why were they gathering dust. A deal was soon negotiated for Rover to buy the design and tooling from GM.

Once Rover got their bargain home they changed the way the iron cylinder liners were installed thus eliminating the major problem GM had been having with castings having to be rejected at a high rate. Then they began building the 3.5 V8s as fast as they could crank them out and used them in their sedans and SUVs. MG even used them in BGTs but chose not to export those to the USA which seems like a huge mistake. Land Rovers were still using them into the 21st century though by then they had been enlarged to 4.6 and generally improved a bit but it was still the same basic design.

But back to the original question of missing horses. Rover claimed just 133 horses (135 with fuel injection). What happened to the other 42? Many would blame the switch from a 4-barrel carb to the twin Zenith Strombergs. Flow tests that I have read show Zeniths actually flow more air than aftermarket carbs and manifolds but I can't say for sure. We do know that Rover dropped the compression ratio down into the low 8s and used a cam engineered for smooth torque and emission compliance rather than big horsepower numbers.



I was reading a magazine talking about American cars and the 1972 cars all claimed far less horses than the same engines did in 1971. And the difference was that 72 was the year horsepower rating was switched from gross to net. Instead of taking the numbers from the crankshaft of an engine on a dyno that ran without exhaust or air cleaners or alternators or cooling fans or any other parasitic drag, they started measuring horsepower at the rear wheels of a complete car. And how much difference did that make? Across the board, the same engine's ratings dropped almost exactly 25%. So you do the math. 175 healthy horses minus 25% equals 131. The missing horses are just busy overcoming the drag inherent in transmissions, drive shafts, differentials, accessory belts, and mufflers. Those 1963 Buick Specials didn't spin the back wheels any harder, they just posted bigger numbers on the air cleaner.



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


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
