

Carburetor King

One man perseveres at a dying art

Pritish carburetor specialist Joe Curto jokes that he's at "the vanguard of a dying industry." Working out of a 2500-square-foot shop in his hometown of Queens, New York, Curto is one of North America's top rebuilders of SU and Stromberg carburetors—which haven't been fitted to a North American production car in at least 20 years.

Like most careers, it started by accident. Although he grew up in unlikely sports car territory, Curto fell in love with the MG TD. "When I was 17 I bought my TD—which I still own. I learned how to repair it because I couldn't afford a mechanic." Joe then became a certified aircraft mechanic, a career he continued when he joined the Navy at 18.

After the service, Curto started repairing British sports cars out of his parents' garage in 1973. He graduated to his own shop because "I liked the work and it provided a living." However, Joe says he "was getting tired of climbing under cars and had little room to bring them inside."

Meanwhile, Curto noticed that *Hemmings Motor News* was starting to expand its advertising of parts and services for old cars. "I decided to do carb stuff," via mail-order, "because that

were something

was something I figured people couldn't do themselves and they could easily stick in a box and send by UPS."


He decided to service every variety of SU and Stromberg, but parts were scarce 20 years ago. Often he'd wait weeks for a shipment, only to find that the parts were sometimes wrong.

Curto remembers, "I'd have to make throttle shafts to fill my twoweek backlog." As a result, he'd have to produce a larger quantity than needed in order to achieve a

low per-unit cost. Then, he'd have the challenge of selling off the balance of the run.

Although Curto buys some parts, he now manufactures many items, including jets, seals and throttle shafts. The parts he produces are bought by shops, catalog vendors and individual customers.

Once Curto gained a clientele, it was only logical to take in other bench work. And be-

cause Curto retained his giant collection of

shop manuals and aftermarket catalogs, he had the resources to tackle virtually any British car subassembly. Now he also rebuilds electric and mechanical fuel pumps, Lucas wiper motors, turn signal switches, trafficators (semaphore turn signals) and brake and clutch hydraulics. "I'll do anything I can put in a box and ship," he says. In addition, Joe likes the challenge of creating custom carburetors, and, when time permits, he'll take on some complete car restorations.

When asked if he's worried about the future, Curto says that "While the overall market actually gets smaller, there are also fewer guys repairing these things. My business keeps growing because more people find out about me." And even with a shrinking market, Curto is sure he'll have enough work to keep him busy—an happy—well into the 21st century.



250 to Santa Fe Pat Fischer

Yes, Roger Elliott and I did a 9-day tour of Santa Fe and Taos via scenic western Kansas, and we took the TR250. In answer to your most pressing questions, no, the forest fires were not a hindrance, and yes, the car ran like a dream. We went well over 2,000 miles in the nine days from May 27-June 4. Part of British Car Week!

The 95-degree-plus weather took us a bit by surprise! We had seriously over-packed cool-weather clothes with long sleeves and cotton sweaters. Well, that's if you can really over-pack a Triumph. I left the plastic liner out of the trunk so we'd have more room; tucked those hiking boots right in there alongside the gas tank. So, we ran out of hot-weather clothes and supplemented by shopping and doing laundry in Espanola halfway through the trip.

The car ran a bit hot -- say 2/3 of the way to hot -- over the Interstate mountain passes the second day out near Santa Fe. I think it was a combination of high speed, high altitude and high temperatures. We slowed down a bit and watched the gauges. It would cool down a little with a long downhill run. In Santa Fe we turned the idle up faster, since at that height it tended to stumble or die at idle. About 90 degrees on both idle screws and we were set for the rest of the trip.

English cars are sparse in New Mexico! Roger saw a Morris Minor (I missed it) and other than a couple new Jags (which don't count) that was the only British car we saw. And the car was a big hit everywhere. People waved or smiled wherever we went or asked us about it. In Espanola a passenger in a pickup truck in the left lane waved us alongside at a stop light. Is that an MG or a Triumph? He apparently won his bet with the driver because he was delighted with the Triumph answer. Many people could not believe we'd driven it so far.

I figured we could ship home anything we bought that wouldn't fit, however, jewelry doesn't take up much room! We spent two days in Santa Fe. While we were there the newest forest fire started up over the mountain near Las Vegas, NM. That was on Memorial Day, and the fire quickly spread to 7,500 acres. It looked like a giant mushroom cloud over the mountain, so huge that we couldn't believe it was from a fire. Leaving Santa Fe we drove southwest, then north to go through the mountains and approached Los Alamos from the west. We didn't go into Los Alamos but drove east past it to stay in Espanola. From there we got an early start the next day to hike Bandelier National Historic Site, the park where the first fire started. We drove along miles of roads with partially burned forests, but the park area where Anasazi ruins are was spared. We did morning and afternoon hikes in beautiful country walking down one trail within sight of the Rio Grande.

We moved on to Taos for shopping, museums and a tour of the pueblo. Staying at a B&B within walking distance of the square is a must. The Carson National Forest nearby was closed due to fire hazard. Since we'd already done our hike time for awhile, it didn't affect our plans in Taos, which included shopping and eating. As we continued driving back north we took scenic roads and swung a bit out of the way to Capulin, a volcano in the NW corner of New Mexico where you can walk down into the crater and completely around the rim. Wonderful views of the plains and old volcanic activity in the area. Then it was back onto I-25 into Colorado and east across the Comanche National Grasslands into Kansas near Garden City.

The trip was wonderful, the car ran great! A book that we got some of our route from, *The Most Scenic Drives in America*, by Reader's Digest is available at Barnes & Noble and other stores. It has "120 Spectacular Road Trips," and is a great planning tool to get you and your Triumph out on the road. Put a Triumph in your next vacation!

The motel in Indy is \$650 for three days, ouch, but it is across the street from the Speedway so I can park the Bimmer and walk all weekend. Land Rover purchase nearing completion

(from "Ford World" and our Ford friend, Richard Woody)

Ford Motor Company's 3 billion Euro (approximately \$2.7 billion) purchase of the Land Rover Group from BMW is seen a giving Ford the opportunity to continue developing the fourwheel-drive market segment.

Chairman and CEO Jac Nasser told reporters, "As the Jaguar of four-wheel-drive vehicles, Land Rover's buyer demographics are supplementary to our present range of 4 X 4 buyers and complementary to our Jaguar and Volvo buyers."

Nasser sees potential for expanding sales of Land Roven vehicles in North America and the rest of the world.

Ford does not assume any debt. However, Nasser said he anticipates there will have to be additional investment before Land Rover will turn a profit, probably in 2002.

"We will need to make sure we have a fully competitive situation going forward," Nasser said. "We will spend the next three months or so ensuring that it (Land Rover) is competitive and will look at what future investments may be required and what revenue and volume potential exists for us."

The investments, Nasser added, will be for a replacement for the Range Rover line that wil soon be launched and for modernizing some other products.

In addition, Nasser said, Ford is committed to having all its vehicles meet low-emissions standards in all states, and Land Rover vehicles will be upgraded to accomplish that.

Ford is purchasing the full line-up of four-wheel-drive vehicles, the Range Rover, Discovery Freelander and Defender units; the Land Rover Solihull assembly plant in Birmingham, England; the *British Motor Industry Heritage Center*; the Gaydon research and development center; the dealer network; and a work force of about 13,000.



The VTR (Vintage Triumph Register) national convention this year was held in Portland, Oregon, on August 2-8. Charlie and I, along with Kent and Kathy Prather and Mark and Vicki Canaday of the Topeka British Car Club, decided months ago that this sounded like a great trip and would be an opportunity to see a part of the country that we hadn't visited before. We stopped to visit with them for awhile and found out they were from Canada. It turned out that one of the guys received the award for driving his Triumph the longest distance to the convention—4,500 miles!

Along our route, we went through the Mt. Hood National Forest, which was very scenic, and we arrived in Portland, our destination, at 4:00 m.

That evening we went to the VTR welcome party where Kathy and I were the lucky winners of two of the door prizes.
